Their contributions include the Harlan Vice Chancellorship in the Institute of Agriculture & Natural Resources, the Neal Harlan Professorship of Agribusiness, the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources Scholarship Program and the Judge Harry A. Spencer Professorship of Law which honors Lee's father, a former Nebraska Supreme Court Justice.

Dr. James T. & Connie Horner Fellowship

Rachel Ibach of Lincoln continues in her second year as the first Dr. James T. and Connie Horner Fellow for Nebraska LEAD Class 42 through the University of Nebraska Foundation. Dr. James T. Horner was born dirt-poor on a small family cotton farm near Hornersville, Missouri, on July 14, 1928, and passed away on July 12, 2022, in Naples, Florida. Dr. Horner excelled academically, militarily and in leadership roles. His undergraduate, master's, and doctoral degrees were earned at the University of Missouri, and he launched his military career through ROTC (United States Army).

In the early 1980s, Dr. Horner took on the responsibility of organizing the Nebraska LEAD Program and served as the "Founding Director." Dr. Horner's organizational skills and leadership served him well and, under his direction, the program got off the ground and has become one of the top programs of its kind in the country today. After some 35 years on the faculty, Jim took early retirement in 1994. During the 2019 LEAD Banquet, he shared, "when people ask me what I am most proud of in my career, I say, 'LEAD.'"

Kreuscher LEAD Fellowship

Traci Menke LEAD 42 of Seward continues in her second year as the first Kreuscher LEAD Fellow. John and Kristi (Kammerer) Kreuscher of Gothenburg established the Kreuscher LEAD Fellowship Fund at the University of Nebraska Foundation to honor their parents who promoted agriculture and leadership. Allen Kreuscher was a founding member of the Nebraska Corn Growers Association and worked to establish the Nebraska Corn Board and Nebraska Ethanol Board. Allen helped establish the DeWitt Grange and Christ Community Church in Beatrice. Marvin Kammerer was a lifelong farmer, a Harlan County Supervisor and a Republican City School Board member. He also served as a 4-H leader for many years.

John is a Nebraska LEAD Class 4 Alumnus and has been involved in agricultural lending for 46 years. Kristi served as the Perkins County Court Clerk Magistrate and then served as a Senior Business Analyst on the JUSTICE Computer Project with the Nebraska Court System.

Lancaster County Farm Bureau LEAD Fellowship
